

**Executive Summary**  
**LELLE Regional Conference**  
**25/05/2017 Veszprém, Hungary**

LELLE (Let's Learn how to Learn) is an Erasmus+ project which envisions to equip and to empower Higher Education Institution (HEI) graduates with the necessary skills for the 21st century workforce. Project partners stem from five countries, namely, the Europa Consortium Regional Development Non-profit Ltd. (ECN), Hungary; University of Pannonia (UP), Hungary; Open University of the Netherlands (OUNL), Netherlands, Institut für berufsbezogene Weiterbildung und Personaltraining GmbH (BEST), Austria and Wrocław University of Economics (WUE), Poland.



University of Pannonia hosted our Regional conference at the end of May, 2017. Amongst the 50 participants were professionals from companies of the county, students and lecturers from other faculties of the University, representatives of training and education institutes and the media.

During the day, a thorough introduction of LELLE results was given and we had a keynote speech delivered by Rita Takács, head of the Student Counselling Centre of the Faculty of Informatics at ELTE – the biggest University of Hungary. The lecture was about how developing learning skills help university students' progress and how they can cope with courses and private life issues with these skills.

After the plenary session, 3 parallel sections started with hands on exercises from the LELLE training materials. It was followed by an open forum where the participants gave detailed feedback on the exercises and the project itself. The regional conference ended with a plenary session on how one can use the outcomes of the project and a discussion on how the improvements trigger different outcomes.



The feedback was positive altogether, even the County Police Department's representatives found it necessary to implement these skills into the training of police officers somehow. As it is not very common in Hungary for university educators to have educational background, many of their feedback suggested that university lecturers need this kind of support in their daily work and they were deeply interested moving forward with LELLE.
